DAY 1

READING/SPEAKING

The "Letter of the Day" is "L" for "légume" (vegetable). As a family go on a scavenger hunt in your cupboards, refrigerator, and freezer to find real "légume" or pictures of them on cans, boxes, or bags. When you find some, say if you like that vegetable or if you don't like it with one of the following sentences:

J'aime ce légume.

OR

Je n'aime pas ce légume.

WRITING

Practice writing the modelled sentences above and illustrate your sentences with a drawing of a "légume" you like and of a "légume" you don't like.

DAY 2

READING/SPEAKING

The "Letter of the Day" is "M" for "manteau" (coat). Have children count all the coats in the house using this sentence structure:
Un (1) manteau,
Deux (2) manteaux,
Trois (3) manteaux, ...

WRITING

Practice writing the modelled sentences and illustrate your sentences with a drawing of a "manteau" you like and a "manteau" you don't like.

J'aime ce manteau.

Je n'aime pas ce manteau.

DAY 3

READING/SPEAKING

The "Letter of the Day" is "M" for "Moi" (me)! Today's speaking challenge is to use the French words for "me too" and "me neither" all day.

Me too = Moi aussi (pronounced "ocee")

Me neither = Moi non plus

WRITING

Create a colourful poster to hang on your fridge as a reminder to everyone in your house to use "moi aussi" and "moi non plus" for the day

Remember to make sure the words are big, like on movie posters.

DAY 4

READING/SPEAKING

The "Letter of the Day" is "J" for "jeu" (game) (pronunciation = rhymes with "deux", 2). Have children name different indoor and outdoor games using this sentence structure:

Le jeu de Monopoly

Le jeu de Scrabble

Le jeu de basketball

Le jeu de hockey

Le jeu de Lego

WRITING

Practice writing the modelled sentences and illustrate your sentences with a drawing of the "jeu" you like and the "jeu" you don't like.

J'aime le jeu de Monopoly.

Je n'aime pas le jeu de basketball.

DAY 5

READING/SPEAKING

The "Letter of the Day" is "V" for "Voilà!" ("There you go!"). Today's speaking challenge is to use the French word "Voilà" ("There you go!") when something works out well or when giving someone an object.

WRITING

Create a colourful poster to hang on your fridge as a reminder to everyone in your house to use "Voilà!" ("There you go!") for the day.

Remember to make sure the word "Voilà" is big, like on movie posters.
