### **Lanark County Support Services – Amanda Banfield**

#### <u>Rural FASD Support Network – Rob More</u> (not in attendance)

Report update: provided via email in August (meeting was cancelled, didn't meet quorum)

- Rural FASD announced with Trillium that we have received a 4 yr. \$500,000 grant from them to establish an office at 88 Cornelia St Unit A1 in Smiths Falls, hire a full-time program coordinator and a full-time admin assistant/marketing person
- This announcement was done in conjunction with MPP Clark, MPP Jordan and Mayor Peckford of North Grenville at our summer social. Discussion also ensued about having Bill 172 reintroduced at Queen's Park soon.
- Rural FASD is hosting the first ever FASD Awareness Day at Parliament Hill with CanFASD and Scott Reid as our sponsoring MP on Oct 20. Shelby De Rose is being invited to address the parliamentarians along with Senator Ravalia.
- Rural FASD provided training to all Open Doors clinicians on recommended mental health strategies focusing on characteristics, best practices and lived experience
- Rural FASD provided training to all Camp Cherith staff on characteristics and lived experience and funded with Calvary Bible Church five families to attend camp this summer.
- The Environmental Scan and Gap Analysis report has been published and released. Forty-two organizations from the counties of Lanark and Leeds-Grenville participated in the report. A full directory of all social services in twelve sectors in the two counties has now created and shared throughout all 42 organizations. Key findings include 57% of participating organizations would like further training on supporting people with FASD and another 22% would like a point of contact for consulting and system navigation. Of the 12 sectors, the least served and least amount of FASD awareness is Community Engagement which includes recreation, events and festivals and volunteer opportunities from an inclusive lens.
- Rural FASD has been invited to join the Rideau Hub and the Situation Table as well.





• Theresa Lalonde-Pankow has been contracted to lead the training module team with support from a certified mental health clinician, a speech-language pathologist, employment counselor, a special education resource educator and four lived experience individuals.

<u>Child and Youth Mental Health Services – Natasha Scott</u> (not in attendance)

Report update: provided via email in August (meeting was cancelled, didn't meet quorum)

- The Day Treatment Program Morrisburg Public School and Cornwall sites have merged and relocated to Rothwell-Osnabruck School. We have three classrooms: Junior, Senior, and a transition room for clients who are transitioning back to their community schools
- Current wait times for services:
  - o Ages 0-3: immediate assignment
  - o Ages 4-6: 4 months (assigning from May)
  - o Ages 7-18 for standard priority: 7 months (assigning from mid-February)
  - o Ages 7-18 for rapid response: generally, within a few weeks
  - o Ages 7-18 for urgent: immediate assignment



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- All CYMHS staff (Day Treatment excluded for now) will have received some level of eating disorder training that is occurring over the next few months. This will help in gaining more knowledge and skills in this area as we continue to see an influx of referrals that list this as a presenting concern.
- All new Day Treatment staff will have been trained completely in SNAP (Stop Now and Plan) by the fall so that the program can continue to run within the Day Treatment program. SNAP is an evidence-based behavioural program that supports children and their parents in effective emotional regulation, self-control, and problem-solving skills.
- Staffing updates: in the process of interviewing for a permanent part-time mental health counsellor position at day treatment; hired a permanent full-time mental health counsellor for our Early Years program (replacement), a temporary full-time mental health counsellor and a permanent full-time addiction and mental health therapist in our core services program (replacement), and a temporary full-time master's prepared therapist (new position) who will be starting on September 21st.
- We are still in the process of recruiting for a psychologist, no updates at this time.
- Our DBT, Doing Better Together-a dialectical behaviour therapy-based group, is starting in the fall and is currently full.

• ECPP Education Community Partnership Program at Bishop Macdonell Catholic School: The mental health counsellor who was the CYMHS liaison for this program left for a temporary CCH position in another department; services will be maintained but temporary changes in the model will be discussed with the ECPP team in September.

#### 8. Department Update – Principal of Special Education,

- There have been a few staffing changes to the department. The Special Education Department is looking forward to working with our community partners and agencies as well as our Special Education school teams to ensure a successful year for our most vulnerable students. We are excited to welcome back Kara Casey back as our psych associate, Kelly Dorion as a Psych Ed Consultant, and Brittnee Starblanket as our Psychologist in Supervised Practice. We also welcome Veronica Proulx-Pilon an elementary Mental Health and Addictions Counsellor for the Western Region. Our Occupational Therapist, Janet Carioni, has resigned, and we are looking for a replacement.
- Our BCCs (Behaviour Crisis Consultants) are now called SCLCs (Student and Community Liaison Consultants) and Pam Dunk is the Student and Community Liaison Coordinator.
- Summer Learning Program: there were 376 students enrolled in 30 primary junior classes during the month of July. 110 students had IEPs and were supported by 30 Educational Assistants. The program focussed on literacy and math, which allowed students the opportunity to bridge their learning with additional small and whole group tasks by using a differentiated instruction.
- Our Summer Transition Program took place last week in two CDSBEO schools to support the
  return to in class learning for students in special education programs. Activities that took
  place included practicing daily routines, such as arrival, washroom, recess, lunch, and
  departure procedures. Students had opportunities to walk around their schools and practice
  fire procedures. They also had the opportunity to participate in social-emotional lessons,
  reinforce skills, and complete language and math activities.
- The annual Learning Fair for educators took place on August 30th amid a variety of Curriculum based workshops. The Special Education Department offered workshops for understanding hearing loss and vision loss. Other workshops which were well attended and directly related to special education focussed on self-care and school mental health resources for students.



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- PD Days: during the PD days staff will be introduced to the recommendations of the Ontario Human Right's commission's The Right to Read inquiry and what it means for the CDSBEO. One of the most impactful recommendations of the Right to Read is that all students will benefit from a structured approach to literacy. The SLP team walked educators through a lesson plan following a structured literacy approach. CDSBEO continues to work toward a structured literacy approach in all classrooms.
- Our schools' special education teams have been busy participating in new SERT professional
  development as well as All SERT training on the Special Education module in ASPENCDSBEO's digital student record system. Our special education consultants are also
  facilitating before and after school IEP writing support for our school SERTs.
- The entire special education department's professionals have been in schools supporting successful transitions for our students.
