## 6. Living with FASD Presentation

We welcomed Rob More, Chair of Rural FASD Support Network to present videos and stories of youth living with FASD from their perspective.

### Conversations about education with FASD- YouTube- Rural FASD Support Network

Shelby, Canada's first Youth Accessibility Leader with FASD, speaks with her brother about how FASD impacts their schooling and shares which strategies work for them:

• Students with FASD have to work two to three times harder than any other child to be able to get their work done.

### Conversations about adaptive skills with FASD- YouTube- Rural FASD Support Network

Shelby, Canada's first Youth Accessibility Leader with FASD, speaks with her mom about how FASD impacts their adaptive skills:

- FASD is life-long, it doesn't go away.
- It's important to remember we're all human beings and we all make mistakes, especially because with FASD, we need to try harder to understand or comprehend what people might pick up quicker than we can.

<u>Conversations about mental health with FASD- YouTube- Rural FASD Support Network</u> Shelby, Canada's first Youth Accessibility Leader with FASD, speaks with her friend and mentor about how FASD impacts their mental health:

• Growth mindset is a big thing - when you don't have the mindset to tell you that you can do it, you're not going to accomplish it.

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• It is important to accommodate and support students with FASD to allow them to be their best selves and know that they are not alone.

Mr. More also discussed his daughter's story and her life with FASD. She continues to learn, grow, and succeed as she navigates living on her own while working at a bakery after attending the Culinary Arts Program at Algonquin College.

A final message highlighted the importance to help people understand that to receive an FASD diagnosis, an individual must be diagnosed with a minimum of three different disabilities (physical, cognitive and communicative), as well as experienced trauma within their social history. We must shift our mindsets and understand life through the lens of students with FASD and complex needs to set them up for success in life.

a. Family and Children's Services of Lanark, Leeds and Grenville – Tom Jordan

We continue to support children with developmental and intellectual disabilities by supporting the CICE (Community Integration through Cooperative Education). The CICE program provides an excellent college pathway for students who may have developmental and intellectual disabilities or other significant learning challenges who require modifications to curriculum and do not have the entrance requirements for other college programs.

# b. Rural FASD Support Network – Cathy Bridson

The organization welcomed a new Marketing and Administrative Coordinator in February who will help support our online presence. We also welcomed a high school co-op student to help us engage with youth.

On March 2<sup>nd</sup> we held our first Mental Health First Aid Training at the Open Doors office. There were eight participants, and it was a great success. Our next training date is scheduled for May 1<sup>st</sup>. On March 16<sup>th</sup>, we held our monthly Caregiver Meeting where we



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had a trauma-informed mindfulness instructor and certified yoga therapist present to the group about mindfulness and stress management.

We are approaching year three of our YOF (Youth Opportunities Fund) Funding. The Executive Director continues to work with Gelder Gingras & Associates on Governance and Strategic Planning.

We are in the planning phase with the Public Health Unit for a Red Shoes Run Family Day to be held on May 11<sup>th</sup> in Montague Township. As part of this, we are working with our school boards to have a presentation on May 10<sup>th</sup> at St. Luke CHS and Montague Public School with RJ Formanek, Red Shoes Rock founder, adult living with FASD, as well as Rural FASD Support Network Youth voices.

We are also beginning to plan our Annual General Meeting which highlights not only youth graduates from grade 8, 12, and post-secondary but those students who have had some form of academic achievement over the past year.

During the month of March, SERTs and Special Education Consultants have been busy reviewing Special Education student data in Aspen to ensure it is ready to be uploaded for the March 31<sup>st</sup> OnSIS. The Special Education Consultants have facilitated 2 training sessions for SERTs to review the steps in the OnSIS review procedure, shared strategies for successful transitions and introduced a guest speaker, our new deaf and hard of hearing teacher. I'm hoping to have this new addition to the department present at SEAC next year.

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School teams are continuing to collaborate with feeder schools and student families to review and implement transition plans for our students with Special Education needs.

The Special Education Department continues to review schools' special education needs for next year and will continue to plan for a successful start for September. Our consultants have been meeting with school teams to support the information gathering of new students to ensure successful transition plans for students entering kindergarten to age 21.

The Special Education department has been busy reviewing and modifying the Special Education annual report. We will continue to review a few chapters of the report with the SEAC committee at each of the upcoming meetings leading into June.
